Cate School, founded in 1910, is a grade 9-12 coeducational boarding school on California's Central Coast. A demanding and engaging academic program, a diverse student body, and a residential emphasis make Cate a distinctive community in which talented students continue their intellectual, moral, physical, and social growth. Cate is committed to offering an educational experience with lifelong meaning and profound value for each student.

Seventy-four percent of the 59 faculty members have advanced degrees. The student-faculty ratio is 5:1 and the average class size is 12. Cate is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

Senior Inquiry Project

The Senior Inquiry Project is a self-initiated academic challenge that fosters mastery of skills particular to a senior's interests. Participants create a proposal that is approved by the Faculty Inquiry Team. A final presentation, publication, performance, exhibition, or event demonstrates the culmination of the year-long project.

Directed Studies

In conjunction with a faculty member, juniors and seniors may design an academic course. Directed Studies are meant to satisfy an interest that lies outside or beyond the established curriculum. Recent examples include architecture, geology and climate change, neuroscience, photojournalism, American Sign Language, meditation and Buddhism, song writing, Latin, and digital video editing and Flash.
